On 19 March 2009, to coincide with the upcoming "Nuit des Bains", BFAS Blondeau Fine Art Services is proud to present at 5 rue de la Muse, Geneva, an exhibition by the French painter **Pierre Dunoyer**.

Born in Marseilles on 20 January 1949, Pierre Dunoyer lives and works in Paris, where he has exhibited since the eighties. That was also a period of long stays in New York – from 1979 to 1985 – where he took part in several group exhibitions. He held his first solo exhibition in London in 1975. It was followed by others in Paris, at the Sonnabend gallery in 1979 and 1980, and in New York. In 1991, for the second exhibition of the Galerie Nationale du Jeu de Paume, Pierre Dunoyer exhibited six series of four *tableaux*.¹

Today we are making over to him our space at 5 rue de la Muse, where he is showing eleven *tableaux*, most of them specially made for this exhibition.

When Pierre Dunoyer began painting in 1976, the influence of *Supports-Surfaces*, a French avant-garde movement active from 1969 to 1972, was on the wane. It had brought together artists such as Louis Cane, Daniel Dezeuze, Jean-Pierre Pincemin and Claude Viallat, who foregrounded the practice of painting at the expense of the subject while questioning the constituent elements of that practice. This method of interrogating the specificity of the painted object, initiated and practised by the founder-members of the group, attracted Dunoyer. He insisted, as they had before him, that where questions arose, they must be answered within the bounds of the *tableau*. He nevertheless held out against their principled deconstruction of painting and the declarations then current concerning its death². *I am playing catch-up*, Dunoyer says, *the decisions were taken twenty years ago. They haven't changed since then and I persist with the question of the tableau. At the outset, everything was based on the death of painting. Immediately the question came: painting maybe, but what about the tableau? What do we do with that?*³

Dunoyer's work derives from his reading of the history of art, in which he sides with the radical minimalists such as Mondrian and Ad Reinhardt. But his work also proceeds from an outlook of profound reflection that embraces philosophy and the human sciences. His work necessarily involves the articulation of his thought. *The tableau constitutes a true statement of being in the world. [...] The tableau is the companion of our trajectory – we, the living. It has nothing to do with the world of yesterday, by which I mean the world as it has always been, the metaphysical world enchained in causalities and categories. We are faced here with a strange solitude that subjugates us. We are the guardians of the past and the future through the enormous present. The tableau articulates the enormity of the present.*⁴

A catalogue will be published to mark the occasion of this exhibition.
